

LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

MISSION

As the voice of the South Side community of Syracuse, The Stand newspaper aims to start a community conversation by inviting residents to share their stories.

Our goal is to have a positive impact on the community by introducing youth and residents to opportunities in journalism while also helping college journalism students gain essential skills needed in their future fields. The goal of The South Side Newspaper Project remains unchanged: to have even more South Side students from local schools involved, feature more stories by community members and gain more support from advertisers.

This year, we succeeded in many of these stated goals by partnering with the Syracuse City School District and a local church's youth group. These efforts allowed us to reach more youth and provide opportunities for them to gain journalism skills and share their voice with the South Side community.

And the project continues to be successful thanks to its unique partnership between Syracuse University's S.I. Newhouse School of Public Communications and the local resident organization, the Southside Community Coalition. This collaboration allows The South Side Newspaper Project to share human-interest stories and provide a real-world reporting opportunity for the university's journalism students.

This past year, we published eight print issues, involved more photo students and professors and welcomed more youth to our community correspondent lineup.

Another new outreach attempt featured The Stand's work live on TV. You may have seen me, other staff or contributors appear on WCNY's Reith Show, a nightly community news show. We appeared each month to spotlight an upcoming print issue and preview our cover story. Unfortunately seven months after the show began, it was canceled.

PARTNERSHIP WITH STUDENTS

Institute of Technology at Syracuse Central

ITC High School prepares students for the 21st century through a rigorous, college-preparatory curriculum with a focus on automotive technology, biotechnology, computer engineering, culinary arts, robotics and media.

Sixteen seniors were part of the media focus during the 2012-2013 school year and partnered with The Stand to gain real-world reporting and multimedia experience.

Students worked as photographers, audio storytellers and reporters for The South Side Newspaper Project. Two seniors spent their final eight weeks of school completing an internship for The Stand, contributing stories and photos to the website.

INVOLVING LOCAL YOUTH

The Stand Collaborates with Teens

Working under the direction of Vincent Cobb, instructional technology analyst at the Newhouse School, The Stand welcomed local teens to contribute video pieces for the newspaper's online site (mysouthsidestand.com).

Students were trained by Cobb and community volunteers on video equipment and editing software in the summer of 2013 and then worked as reporters under the direction of volunteer broadcast journalism students to create news stories about South Side residents and events.

Youth and volunteers work out of the Greater Evangelical Church of God in Christ, located at 4325 S. Salina St., where students have access to a computer lab and equipment.

The teens completed their first pieces as part of The Stand's annual Juneteenth celebration coverage.

Community Outreach

Speaking Up for Local News Coverage

During the 2012-2013 fiscal year, The Stand's director participated in several local events to speak about the importance of local news.

- April 4, 2012: **The News Re-Imagined** As part of the "In-depth Local News: Successes and Challenges" panel, Kang spoke on the newspaper's experiences in providing consistent and specialized coverage of local issues.
- Fall 2012: Citizen's Academy Kang completed an interactive educational program informing citizens about how local governments are organized and how services are funded and delivered. The semester-long course was sponsored by FOCUS Greater Syracuse, the City of Syracuse, Onondaga County and SU's University College.
- Nov. 13, 2012: **Meet Your Local Media Panel** Kang spoke as part of a discussion sponsored by the Central New York Community Foundation for local news directors and nonprofits.


